The primary activity for Flight University trainees in February was exploring circuitry using snap circuit kits, made possible through the PNG Grant.

After the first week, participants were able to begin exploring/building the circuits on their own with minimal guidance. Favorite circuits included the flying saucer, water alarms, and pretty much any activity that produced sound.

While it was a blast learning about electricity in this hands on fashion, trainees have now moved onto newer flight topics. However, the circuit kits are available for

What is PNG?

Project Next Generation (PNG) is an educational technology initiative of Illinois Secretary of State and State Librarian, Jesse White, which was established to help educate students and bridge the digital divide. By providing technology training for students, PNG empowers students to succeed academically and eventually as independent, contributing members of society.

In service of this mission, the PNG program offers grant funding to libraries for establishing after-school training programs that not only provide access to computers, software and various technology devices, but also hire mentors who are crucial to helping students develop self-confidence and pride in their newly acquired skills.

The Sparta Public Library was awarded a grant for 2015 from the Illinois State Library which funds Flight University.

Looking Ahead...

As the trainees finish up their gliders, we're looking ahead to what's in store the rest of this spring. While much scheduling is still being done and many details are being ironed out there are several opportunities in the works which the trainees are sure to enjoy including: kite building, a visit from the Civil Air Patrol, and an air port tour, tentatively scheduled for March 26th.
